Australian unemployment rate by state & territory Share of the labour force (%), trend








Australian employment by industry


Employment change since February 2020 ('000s)



2. Disability in the workforce

Employment and disability

2.1 million Australians aged 15-64 have a disability (2018)

Lower participation in the workforce

- 53% for people with a disability.
- 84% for people without a disability.

Less secure work

- 41% of workers with a disability employed parttime.
- 32% for people without a disability.



Unemployment and disability

Unemployment rate for people with a disability is 10.3% (2018)

• 4.6% for people without a disability.

Varies considerably by disability

- Sensory / speech disabilities: 8.2%
- Psychosocial disabilities: 23.6%

Varies considerably by age

- 25% for those aged 15 to 24.
- 5.6% for those aged 45 to 54.





Q: In the next 12 months, which of the following initiatives will your workplace emphasise first?







Share of available jobs vacant (%), March quarter 2023



Increasing awareness of company benefits / perks

- Signing bonuses
- Paid parental leave
- Job sharing

More likely to advertise pay

• 35% of Australian job postings have pay information. Up from 27% four years ago.

Job postings on Indeed with pay information receive 30% more apply starts






5. Closing thoughts

Australian labour market expectations

Labour demand

- $2022 \rightarrow$ record job vacancies
- $2023 \rightarrow$ likely to ease considerably.

Labour supply

- $2022 \rightarrow$ Large shortage of candidates.
- $2023 \rightarrow$ High immigration helps ease shortages.

Unemployment rate expected to remain low but considerable uncertainty.

Recruitment will still be difficult, just less difficult.



Final thoughts on disability, employment and cost-ofliving

Still a lot of work to do

- Participation in the workforce unchanged.
- Unemployment higher than it should be.

Cost-of-living crisis

- People with a disability more vulnerable to costof-living pressures.
- More likely to be unemployed or in an insecure job.
- More likely to be lower-income or below median.
